


Use the newspaper to keep up with the stories of the day - you never know what helpful information you might find.



### BULLETIN THE BANK OF ENGLAND

In response to the recent counterfeiting epidemic, the Bank of England has issued the following reminder regarding legal tender. ONLY the following named Coinage may be used by British businesses: The lowest denomination of coin accepted is the farthing, worth a quarter-penny. As well as the penny, the following is also legal tender: a half-penny, a two-penny piece, and a four-penny piece (known as a groat). There are twelve pennies to a shilling, and a florin is worth two shillings. Neither to be mistaken for a crown, which is worth five shillings. If a man presents a pound, its value is that of twenty shillings or two hundred and forty pence.

# HOUSE OF LORDS VOTE TO-DAY The House of Lords will today host yet another historic vote on amendments to Britain's ancient democracy. The vote concerns the Redistribution of Seats Act, proposed by Prime Minister William Gladstone, which would re-draw the boundary lines of many constituencies in England. Proponents of the Bill say that it will give fairer representation to the populace and remove rotten boroughs. Some Liberal Party members argue that this is a paltry effort, and that only Proportional Representation would be truly democratic. Opposition Party members argue that the Bill is too radical, and will change the landscape of politics to mere populism. This Bill is associated with the Third Reform Bill, which passed last year as the Representation of the People Act. Readers may remember that the Bill of 1884 passed the vote in the House of Lords by only one, so the public can no doubt expect similarly close counts today.









## LOCATION BOND STREET


t takes you no time at all to find Madame de Mercier's elegant boutique. Mme de Mercier herself greets you as you enter; a tall, stately older woman with stern face and twinkling eye. She regards you critically then passes you a length of cloth. Don't worry', she says. 'I know exactly why you're here - you've done well to follow Miss Holmes' clues so far. I will help you on your way, but only if you can perform this simple test; a test of dress, deportment, and dexterity. Fold this cloth into a bow using the knot we call 'Entangle Herb.' You may want to keep a stack of extra cloths on hand, in case the first one crumples.

1. Fold the unpatterned side corners towards the centre as indicated.




- 2. Then fold the edges towards the centre as shown.
- 3. Create creases along the indicated lines by folding and unfolding the paper at right angles.
- 4. Tuck the centre angled creases inwards. This will fold together the two wings so that the points meet.
- 5. Fold back the top and bottom wings, along the indicated line.
- 6 Fold corners towards centre.
- 7. Turn over and repeat.
- 8. Open out the bow and gently pull out the wings to flatten




